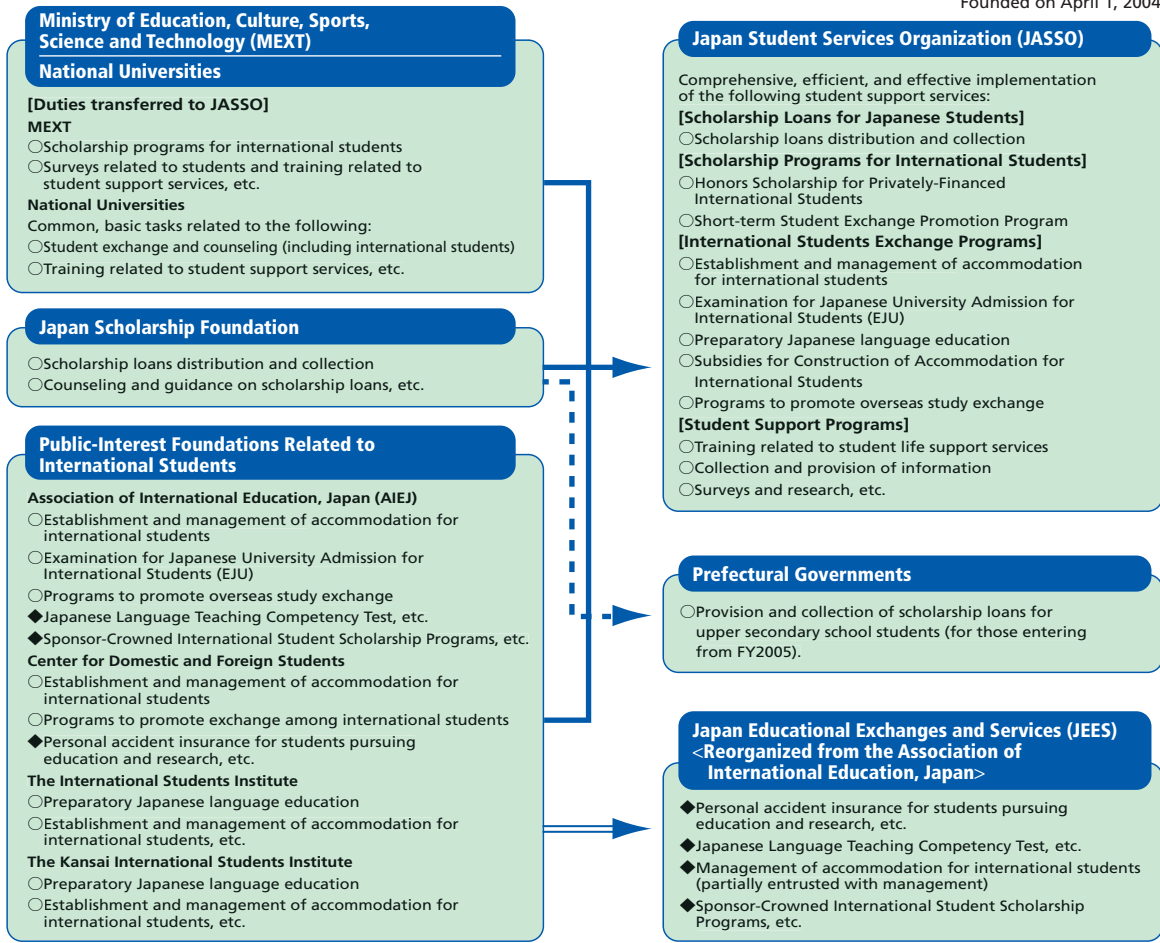

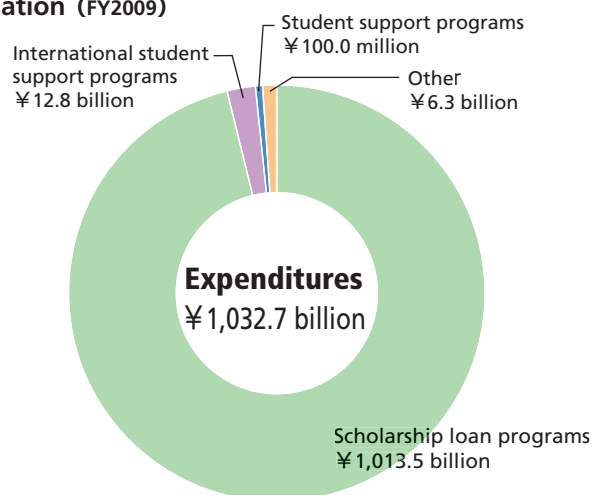
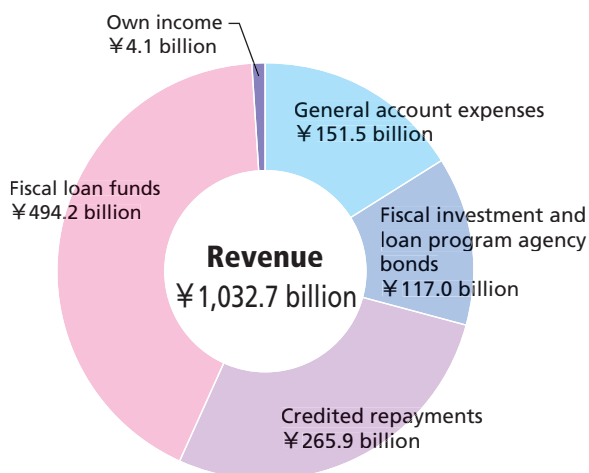

Breakdown of Budget of Japan Student Services Organization (FY2009)



◎The general account expenses include the following: Government loans ¥70.4 billion, Subsidies for high school student scholarships ¥28.1 billion, interest replenishment ¥28.7 billion, subsidy on scholarship payback exemption, etc. ¥3.7 billion, administration expense subsidy ¥18.3 billion, subsidy on international student support programs ¥2.3 billion.
