What is culture shock?

So-called "culture shock" is typically described in a series of stages. How long stage, you may feel confused and each of these may last (or even cycle) depends on the individual

Stage 1: The Honeymoon Phase

As it applies to relationships, too, the honeymoon phase is a period in which you can't get enough of your new environment. You notice differences in the culture around you largely as positives-everything is new and thrilling! During this period, you are looking at Japan very much like a tourist support from friends. Stage 2: Culture Shock

Stage 4: Adaptation/Assimilation During the final phase of culture shock, which may come in month or years, a person will feel comfortable and familiar with their host culture. This doesn't mean complete cultural understanding or conversion, but that you are able to navigate your environment with ease, and participate fully in your host culture.
