Note the following :

(1) Reduce square roots ($\sqrt{\quad}$) as much as possible.

(Example : Express $\sqrt{32}$ as $4\sqrt{2}$, not as $2\sqrt{8}$ or $\sqrt{32}$.)

(2) For fractions, attach the minus sign to the numerator, and reduce the fraction to its lowest terms.

(Example : Substitute $\frac{1}{3}$ for $\frac{2}{6}$. Also simplify as follows :

$-\frac{2}{\sqrt{6}} = \frac{-2\sqrt{6}}{6} = \frac{-\sqrt{6}}{3}$. Then apply $\frac{-\sqrt{6}}{3}$ to the answer.)

(3) If your answer to $\frac{\boxed{A}\sqrt{\boxed{B}}}{\boxed{C}}$ is $\frac{-\sqrt{3}}{4}$, mark as shown below.

(4) If the answer to $\boxed{DE}x$ is $-x$, mark “-” for **D** and “1” for **E** as shown below.

I

Q 1 Let $a \neq 0$. Let G be a curve which is symmetric with respect to the origin $(0, 0)$ to the graph of the quadratic function in x

$$y = ax^2 - 4x - 4a. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{1}$$

(1) The coordinates of the vertex of the graph of $\textcircled{1}$ are

$$\left(\frac{\boxed{\text{A}}}{a}, -\frac{\boxed{\text{B}}}{a} - 4a \right).$$

(2) Among the following choices, the quadratic function whose graph is G is $\boxed{\text{C}}$.

- $\textcircled{0} \ y = ax^2 + 4x + 4a$ $\textcircled{1} \ y = ax^2 + 4x - 4a$ $\textcircled{2} \ y = ax^2 - 4x + 4a$
 $\textcircled{3} \ y = -ax^2 + 4x + 4a$ $\textcircled{4} \ y = -ax^2 - 4x + 4a$ $\textcircled{5} \ y = -ax^2 - 4x - 4a$

(3) The curve G intersects the graph of the quadratic function $\textcircled{1}$ at the two points

$$\left(\boxed{\text{DE}}, \boxed{\text{F}} \right) \quad \text{and} \quad \left(\boxed{\text{G}}, \boxed{\text{HI}} \right).$$

(4) Let $a = 2$. Then over the interval $\boxed{\text{DE}} \leq x \leq \boxed{\text{G}}$, the maximum and the minimum values of the quadratic function whose graph is G are $\boxed{\text{JK}}$ and $\boxed{\text{LM}}$, respectively.

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Mathematics—4

Q 2 Consider the following equation in x

$$|ax - 11| = 4x - 10, \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{1}$$

where a is a constant.

(1) Equation $\textcircled{1}$ can be rewritten without using the absolute value symbol as

$$\text{when } ax \geq 11, \quad \text{then } (a - \boxed{\text{N}})x = \boxed{\text{O}};$$

$$\text{when } ax < 11, \quad \text{then } (a + \boxed{\text{P}})x = \boxed{\text{QR}}.$$

(2) When $a = \sqrt{7}$, the solution of equation $\textcircled{1}$ is

$$x = \frac{\boxed{\text{S}} \left(\boxed{\text{T}} - \sqrt{\boxed{\text{U}}} \right)}{\boxed{\text{V}}}.$$

(3) Let a be a positive integer. When equation $\textcircled{1}$ has a positive integral solution, we have

$$a = \boxed{\text{W}}, \text{ and that solution } x = \boxed{\text{X}}.$$

II

Q 1 There are two boxes, A and B.

In box A, there are three cards on which the number 0 is written, two cards on which the number 2 is written, and one card on which the number 3 is written.

In box B, there are two cards on which the number 1 is written, and three cards on which the number 2 is written.

Take two cards together from box A and one card from box B. Denote the product of the numbers on the three cards by X .

The total number of values which X can take is . The maximum value which X can take is . The minimum value which X can take is .

The probability that $X =$ is $\frac{\text{E}}{\text{FG}}$, and the probability that $X =$ is $\frac{\text{H}}{\text{I}}$.

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Mathematics—8

Q 2 Consider a triangle ABC where $AB = 8$, $AC = 5$ and $\angle BAC = 60^\circ$. Take point D and point E on sides AB and AC, respectively, such that the segment DE divides triangle ABC into two parts with the equal areas. Set $x = AD$.

(1) When we represent AE in terms of x , we have $AE = \frac{\boxed{\text{JK}}}{x}$.

(2) When E moves along side AC, the range of the values which x can take is

$$\boxed{\text{L}} \leq x \leq \boxed{\text{M}}.$$

(3) Since $DE^2 = \left(x - \frac{\boxed{\text{NO}}}{x}\right)^2 + \boxed{\text{PQ}}$, the length of segment DE is minimized at $x = \boxed{\text{R}}\sqrt{\boxed{\text{S}}}$, and its length there is $\boxed{\text{T}}\sqrt{\boxed{\text{U}}}$.


III

Consider a figure made by cutting two corners from a rectangle, as in the diagram to the right. The lengths of the sides are

$$AB = 11, \quad BC = 4, \quad CD = 2\sqrt{13},$$

$$DE = 5, \quad EF = 2\sqrt{5}, \quad FA = 6.$$

We are to find the area of this figure.



First, extend the sides of the figure as in the diagram and denote the sides forming the right angles by x , y , u and v . Then

$$u = \boxed{\text{A}} - y, \quad v = x + \boxed{\text{B}}.$$

Substituting these expressions in the equation $u^2 + v^2 = \boxed{\text{CD}}$ and also using the equation $x^2 + y^2 = \boxed{\text{EF}}$, we obtain

$$x = \boxed{\text{G}} y - \boxed{\text{H}}.$$

Then, since

$$\boxed{\text{I}} y^2 - \boxed{\text{J}} y - \boxed{\text{K}} = 0,$$

we obtain $y = \boxed{\text{L}}$.

From this we have $x = \boxed{\text{M}}$, and further $u = \boxed{\text{N}}$ and $v = \boxed{\text{O}}$. Finally we conclude that the area of this figure is $\boxed{\text{PQ}}$.

IV

Let x and y be real numbers which satisfy

$$3x^2 + 2xy + 3y^2 = 32. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{1}$$

Then we are to find the ranges of the values of $x + y$ and xy .

First, we set

$$a = x + y. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{2}$$

By eliminating y from $\textcircled{1}$ and $\textcircled{2}$, we obtain the quadratic equation in x

$$\boxed{\text{A}} x^2 - \boxed{\text{B}} ax + \boxed{\text{C}} a^2 - 32 = 0.$$

Since x is a real number, we have

$$\boxed{\text{DE}} \leq a \leq \boxed{\text{F}}. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{3}$$

Next, we set

$$b = xy. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{4}$$

From $\textcircled{1}$, $\textcircled{2}$ and $\textcircled{4}$ we obtain

$$b = \frac{\boxed{\text{G}}}{\boxed{\text{H}}} a^2 - \boxed{\text{I}}. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{5}$$

Hence from $\textcircled{3}$ and $\textcircled{5}$ we have

$$\boxed{\text{JK}} \leq b \leq \boxed{\text{L}}.$$

I

Q 1 Let $a \neq 0$. Let G be a curve which is symmetric with respect to the origin $(0, 0)$ to the graph of the quadratic function in x

$$y = ax^2 - 4x - 4a. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{1}$$

(1) The coordinates of the vertex of the graph of $\textcircled{1}$ are

$$\left(\frac{\boxed{\text{A}}}{a}, -\frac{\boxed{\text{B}}}{a} - 4a \right).$$

(2) Among the following choices, the quadratic function whose graph is G is $\boxed{\text{C}}$.

- $\textcircled{0} \ y = ax^2 + 4x + 4a$ $\textcircled{1} \ y = ax^2 + 4x - 4a$ $\textcircled{2} \ y = ax^2 - 4x + 4a$
 $\textcircled{3} \ y = -ax^2 + 4x + 4a$ $\textcircled{4} \ y = -ax^2 - 4x + 4a$ $\textcircled{5} \ y = -ax^2 - 4x - 4a$

(3) The curve G intersects the graph of the quadratic function $\textcircled{1}$ at the two points

$$\left(\boxed{\text{DE}}, \boxed{\text{F}} \right) \quad \text{and} \quad \left(\boxed{\text{G}}, \boxed{\text{HI}} \right).$$

(4) Let $a = 2$. Then over the interval $\boxed{\text{DE}} \leq x \leq \boxed{\text{G}}$, the maximum and the minimum values of the quadratic function whose graph is G are $\boxed{\text{JK}}$ and $\boxed{\text{LM}}$, respectively.

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Mathematics—18

Q 2 Consider the following equation in x

$$|ax - 11| = 4x - 10, \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{1}$$

where a is a constant.

(1) Equation $\textcircled{1}$ can be rewritten without using the absolute value symbol as

$$\text{when } ax \geq 11, \quad \text{then } (a - \boxed{\text{N}})x = \boxed{\text{O}};$$

$$\text{when } ax < 11, \quad \text{then } (a + \boxed{\text{P}})x = \boxed{\text{QR}}.$$

$$a = \boxed{\text{W}}, \text{ and that solution } x = \boxed{\text{X}}.$$

II

Suppose that a triangle ABC which is inscribed in a circle O of radius 2 satisfies

$$3\vec{OA} + 4\vec{OB} + 2\vec{OC} = \vec{0}. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{1}$$

Let D denote the point of intersection of the straight line AO and the segment BC. We are to find the lengths of the segments AD and BD.

(1) When we set $\vec{OD} = k\vec{OA}$ where k is a real number, we have

$$\vec{OD} = -\frac{\boxed{\text{A}}}{\boxed{\text{B}}}k\vec{OB} - \frac{\boxed{\text{C}}}{\boxed{\text{D}}}k\vec{OC}.$$

As the three points B, C and D are located on a straight line, we obtain $k = \frac{\boxed{\text{EF}}}{\boxed{\text{G}}}$.

From this we derive that $OD = \boxed{\text{H}}$ and finally obtain

$$AD = \boxed{\text{I}}.$$

(2) From (1) we see that $BD = \frac{\boxed{\text{J}}}{\boxed{\text{K}}}BC$. So in order to find the length of the segment BD, we should find the length of the segment BC.

First we note that

$$BC^2 = \boxed{\text{L}} - \boxed{\text{M}}\vec{OB} \cdot \vec{OC},$$

where $\vec{OB} \cdot \vec{OC}$ represents the inner product of \vec{OB} and \vec{OC} .

Since we know from $\textcircled{1}$ that $|4\vec{OB} + 2\vec{OC}|^2 = \boxed{\text{NO}}$, we have

$$\vec{OB} \cdot \vec{OC} = \frac{\boxed{\text{PQR}}}{\boxed{\text{S}}}.$$

Hence we obtain $BC = \frac{\boxed{\text{T}}\sqrt{\boxed{\text{U}}}}{\boxed{\text{V}}}$ and finally from that

$$BD = \frac{\sqrt{\boxed{\text{W}}}}{\boxed{\text{X}}}.$$

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This is the end of the questions for Part . Leave the answer spaces , of Part blank.

III

Let x and y be positive numbers which satisfy

$$(\log_2 x)^2 + (\log_2 y)^2 = \log_2 \frac{8x^2}{y^2}. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{1}$$

We are to find the maximum value of xy^2 and the values of x and y at that point.

- (1) The right side of $\textcircled{1}$ can be transformed into

$$\log_2 \frac{8x^2}{y^2} = \boxed{\text{A}} \log_2 x - \boxed{\text{B}} \log_2 y + \boxed{\text{C}}.$$

So, setting $X = \log_2 x$ and $Y = \log_2 y$, we can express $\textcircled{1}$ in terms of X and Y as

$$\left(X - \boxed{\text{D}}\right)^2 + \left(Y + \boxed{\text{E}}\right)^2 = \boxed{\text{F}}. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{2}$$

- (2) Set $k = \log_2 xy^2$. Using X and Y above, this equality can be transformed into

$$X + \boxed{\text{G}}Y - k = 0. \quad \dots\dots\dots \textcircled{3}$$

If we graph $\textcircled{2}$ and $\textcircled{3}$ on a plane with coordinates (X, Y) , the graph of $\textcircled{2}$ is a circle, and the graph of $\textcircled{3}$ is a straight line. When k is maximized, the graph of $\textcircled{3}$ is tangent to the graph of $\textcircled{2}$. Hence, when $k = \boxed{\text{H}}$, xy^2 takes the maximum value $\boxed{\text{IJ}}$ and in this case $x = \boxed{\text{K}}$ and $y = \boxed{\text{L}}$.

IV

Q 1 Let a be a constant. Assume that the function

$$f(x) = 2 \sin^3 x + a \sin 2x + \frac{9}{2} \cos 2x - 9 \cos x - 2ax + 6$$

takes a local extremum at $x = \frac{\pi}{3}$. We consider about the maximum and minimum values of $f(x)$ over the interval $0 \leq x \leq \frac{\pi}{2}$.

(1) Since $f(x)$ takes a local extremum at $x = \frac{\pi}{3}$, it follows that $a = \frac{\boxed{\text{A}}}{\boxed{\text{B}}}$.

Hence the derivative $f'(x)$ of $f(x)$ can be expressed as

$$f'(x) = \boxed{\text{C}} \sin x \left(\boxed{\text{D}} \cos x - 1 \right) \left(\sin x - \boxed{\text{E}} \right).$$

(2) It can be seen from the result of (1) that $f(x)$ over $0 \leq x \leq \frac{\pi}{2}$ takes the maximum value at $x = \boxed{\text{F}}$ and the minimum value at $x = \boxed{\text{G}}$, where $\boxed{\text{F}}$ and $\boxed{\text{G}}$ are the appropriate expressions from among ① ~ ④ below.

- ① 0 ② $\frac{\pi}{6}$ ③ $\frac{\pi}{4}$ ④ $\frac{\pi}{3}$ ⑤ $\frac{\pi}{2}$

Q 2 A sequence $\{a_n\}$ is defined as

$$a_n = \int_0^{\frac{1}{4}} x^n e^{-x} dx \quad (n = 1, 2, 3, \dots).$$

Then

$$a_1 = -\frac{\boxed{\text{H}}}{\boxed{\text{I}}} e^{\frac{\boxed{\text{JK}}}{\boxed{\text{L}}}} + 1.$$

Also a_{n+1} can be expressed in terms of a_n as

$$a_{n+1} = -\left(\frac{\boxed{\text{M}}}{\boxed{\text{N}}}\right)^{n+1} e^{\frac{\boxed{\text{JK}}}{\boxed{\text{L}}}} + (n + \boxed{\text{O}})a_n \quad (n = 1, 2, 3, \dots).$$

When this is transformed into

$$na_n = a_{n+1} - a_n + \left(\frac{\boxed{\text{M}}}{\boxed{\text{N}}}\right)^{n+1} e^{\frac{\boxed{\text{JK}}}{\boxed{\text{L}}}},$$

we have

$$\sum_{k=1}^n ka_k = a_{n+1} - a_1 + \frac{\boxed{\text{P}}}{\boxed{\text{QR}}} e^{\frac{\boxed{\text{JK}}}{\boxed{\text{L}}}} \left\{ 1 - \left(\frac{\boxed{\text{S}}}{\boxed{\text{T}}}\right)^n \right\}.$$

Since, for $0 \leq x$, the range of values of e^{-x} is $0 < e^{-x} \leq \boxed{\text{U}}$, it follows that

$$0 < a_n < \int_0^{\frac{1}{4}} \boxed{\text{U}} x^n dx = \frac{1}{\boxed{\text{V}}^{n+1} (n+1)}.$$

Thus, since

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} a_n = \boxed{\text{W}},$$

we obtain

$$\lim_{n \rightarrow \infty} \sum_{k=1}^n ka_k = \frac{\boxed{\text{X}}}{\boxed{\text{Y}}} e^{\frac{\boxed{\text{JK}}}{\boxed{\text{L}}}} - 1.$$
